From Pastor Amy



What I like best about the Advent and Christmas seasons is how rich they are with traditions and rituals. Decorating my parents' Christmas tree with my nieces, baking Christmas cookies, planning the Christmas Day scavenger hunt, and making tea ring for Christmas morning just the way my grandma did (and

her mother before her!) are so much fun and I look forward to these things all year. I come to the candlelight Christmas Eve worship service and think about all the Christmas Eves over the years – sitting with my family, singing the many beautiful carols, the years where, as confirmation students, we helped with the sermon, and of course lighting candles during the singing of Silent Night.

Each tradition we have holds within it memories and stories of days gone by. These traditions and stories connect us through the generations, with both generations past and generations to come. They are not only part of our history, but are also part of our legacy.

The Christmas story, from beginning to end, is a story that also connects us with saints throughout the ages. The generations that lived prior to Jesus' birth longed for the coming of the Messiah. They waited in anticipation for the coming of the one sent from God who would redeem them. The Christmas story begins with the stories of these saints and how God was faithful to them as they lived in their own advent waiting. The birth of Jesus, the Messiah for whom God's people yearned, was the fulfilment of prophecy and promise – God's promise to save God's people. While Jesus' birth in Bethlehem was somewhat unassuming, salvation history took a drastic turn. God became flesh in the person Jesus to walk and live among us, to show us how to live a life under the reign of God, and to give his life that we might have eternal life.

We are many generations removed from Jesus physical life on earth, but we, like our ancestors of old, find ourselves in advent waiting for the coming of Jesus into the world in all his fullness of glory. We continue to live the Christmas story. Like our biblical ancestors, we too experience God's faithfulness in our waiting. Like Mary we offer ourselves to the service of God. Like Joseph we dare to choose a better way – God's way – rather than giving into the pressures of the world. Like the shepherds we are given the good news of Jesus to share. And like the wise men, we still seek Jesus in our world today.

The Christmas story is the story of God with us – yet, still, and always. This Advent and Christmas our theme is "From Generation to Generation." We will reflect on how Christmas story comes to us from generations past, continues in our own generation, and how we are to pass this embodied story to future generations.

From Generation to Generation reminds us of the ways our lives, histories, actions, and stories are interconnected and woven together. The work of God is always unfolding— in and through us. This Advent season, how will we carry it forth?

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Blessed Beyond Belief

World Relief estimates that there are 80 million people around the globe who have been forced, or made the painful choice to leave their home. Threatened by extreme poverty, violence and oppression, they leave behind everything familiar to seek a life free from fear. If they are lucky enough to gain refugee status (a long, complicated, difficult process), some of them come to America.

In the case of the Isaac family, they landed at the Appleton Airport on June 26. Now, imagine, you step off the plane with only the clothing you have on your back and in a small suitcase. You have only the money you may or may not have in your pocket. You aren't sure exactly where you are or where you need to go.

But you have friends. The Isaacs were met by our Good Neighbor Team, a case worker from World Relief, and the people from Zion French African Church in Appleton. After celebratory prayers and singing, they were transported to their new residence.

This was the first blessing. In Africa they lived in a small two-room house, with no kitchen (cooking was done out of doors). When they saw their two-story house with an apartment on each floor (complete with kitchens, they were amazed and gratified, almost to the point of tears. When the three little girls saw their bedroom, they cried out, "We have beds!" and gleefully jumped on them. Within two weeks, the family requested an American flag to display on the front of the house to show their joy and gratitude.

In the first two months, they were dependent on the Good Neighbor Team and World Relief caseworkers to help them meet basic needs – grocery shopping, required health assessment appointments, Social Security, school enrollment, and other things.

But they are growing ever more independent. JR took the initiative to contact the landlord for permission to attach the flag to the front of the house. Mama Vivian, JR, William, and Dorcas now have full-time jobs, and have worked out the transportation needed to get them to and from work. Danielle is in high school (getting mostly "A"s) and has a weekend job on Saturdays and Sundays. The three little ones live too close to their school to be bussed, so the family has worked out getting them to and fro.

William recently returned from South Carolina, where he became engaged to Joyce, herself newly-arrived from Africa. JR has begun the process of bringing his wife, Rebecca, and their babies to Appleton. In short, the Isaacs are succeeding in making a life here – a life filled with gratitude, free from fear, and full of blessings.

But they aren't the only ones blessed. The Good Neighbor Team has been blessed with new friendships, the joy of seeing the children play in the park and on the soccer field, and hearing them sing in the car on the way somewhere. Most of all, we are acutely aware of the blessing of the Holy Spirit, whose power we have felt in this whole process to make this little part of the world more full of love, friendship, joy, and hope.
